MAYNARD—Services for the two victims of the tornado that struck Maynard Wednesday will be held Saturday afternoon at the United Presbyterian church here.

Services for Glenda Kelly, 4, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Kelly, will be held at 1:30 p.m. Services for Mrs. Louis Ponsar, 77, will be held at 3 p.m. Both bodies are at the Delsing-Wright funeral home. Burial for both will be in Long Grove cemetery.

Mrs. Ponsar's house was flattened in the storm. She was found unconscious in a nearby field where she had apparently been blown. She died shortly afterward.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Gordon Sanford of Waverly; three sons, Milton of Elkader; Elmer of Solon and Louis of Manchester; one brother, Anton Haas of Maynard and three sisters, Mrs. Delos Watenpaugh of Maynard; Mrs. John Reuckert of Waterloo and Mrs. Howard Hartman of Edgewood.

The Kelly child, her mother and three brothers were found in the yard of their demolished home. The child was declared dead on arrival at University hospitals in Iowa City. Mrs. Kelly remains in the intensive care ward of a Waterloo hospital and the three boys are hospitalized in Sumner.

Glenda is survived by her parents, three brothers, Gerold, Paul and Galen, and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Kelly of Maynard.

Astronaut To Be Iowa U. Speaker

IOWA CITY — Astronaut James A. Lovell, jr., will deliver two speeches at the University of Iowa Saturday.

The veteran of two Gemini space flights will speak at 11 a.m. Saturday in the Pharmacy auditorium on "Medical Aspects of the Gemini Flights".

After initiation ceremonies of Alpha Omega Alpha, the navy captain will speak to members of the national honorary medical society Saturday evening at the University Athletic club. His topic will be "Upcoming Apollo Missions".

On Dec. 4, 1965, Lovell and command pilot Frank Borman were launched into space on the history-making Gemini 7 mission. The flight lasted 330 hours and 35 minutes to become the longest manned space flight.

The following Nov. 11, Lovell and Pilot Edwin Aldrin brought the Gemini program to successful close with the 60-orbit Gemini 12 mission.

As a result of his participation in the two Gemini flights, Lovell holds the space endurance record, with 425 hours and 10 minutes, for total time spent in space.

Festival Is Saturday C.R. Band Parade Route Listed

Forty marching units will parade through downtown Cedar Rapids at 10:30 a.m. Saturday to open the twenty-second annual Eastern Iowa Band Festival.

It will be the largest festival parade since 1964 when 43 units participated and it will be the first festival in which all post-parade activities will be held in Greene Square.

Chairman Dale Black of the sponsoring Jaycees Friday listed the parade route and also said that bands will be permitted to stage short maneuvers, stunts and dances along the parade route.

The parade will start at Fourth avenue and Sixth street SE. The bands will move north on Sixth street to Second avenue, west to Third

street, north to First avenue, west to Second street, south to Third avenue and east to Fifth street, the dispersal point.

A naval reserve color guard will lead the parade. The unit will be followed by convertibles carrying Mayor Frank Bosh; State Sen. Tom Riley (R-Cedar Rapids), who is the parade marshal, and Janene Willer of Center Point, the reigning "Miss Eastern Iowa".

First band will be the Kennedy high school band, which will be making its first appearance in the festival. Participants also will include the Jefferson and Washington bands, the Cedar Rapids Grenadiers drum and bugle corps, directed by Don Eden, the Emerald Knights Drum

and Bugle Corps, directed by Bill Dimmitt; and the Scarlet Angels, Eagles club award-winning drill team directed by Mrs. Elmer Mowry. Each of the 35 visiting high school bands will be preceded by its nominee for the title of "Miss Eastern Iowa."

The visiting bands will be judged during the parade and the winners will be announced at a 3 p.m. awards ceremony in Greene Square.

Festivities will get underway in Greene Square at 1:30 p.m. when the Major 7th, a popular seven-piece band featuring the style of the Tijuana Brass, will take over on the bandstand.

"There will be no admission charge, of course. The Major

7th was selected because its musical style and entertainment should appeal to both young and old." Black said.

At 3 p.m., the awards ceremony will get underway with the presentation of trophies to the top three bands in each of three divisions. It will climax with the announcement of the "outstanding bandmaster of 1968" and the crowning of the new "Miss Eastern Iowa."

The queen nominees and their bandmasters will be guests at a 12:45 p.m. luncheon in the Montrose hotel. Band directors will select the outstanding bandmaster at that time and a panel of judges will take a final look at the queen nominees.

Still Seeking Clues in Geraldine Maggert Death

IOWA CITY — It will be six weeks Saturday since the bruised and scratched body of Mrs. Geraldine Maggert, 25, Cedar Rapids, was found in a wooded ravine at the Coralville reservoir north of North Liberty.

Since that time, Johnson county sheriff's officers and agents of the Iowa bureau of criminal investigation (BCI) have been trying to determine the circumstances of her death.

Seek Information

Tom Hopewell of the BCI said Thursday that at the present time the investigation is centering on ascertaining the whereabouts of Mrs. Maggert between March 22 and the date (April 6) her body was found. Mrs. Maggert was an office worker at the Cedar Rapids urban renewal office. On March 22 she had not reported for work, but had called to say that she was not feeling well.

Hopewell said investigators feel she had gone someplace out of town during this period, but that as of now have been unable to establish where this might have been.

Mrs. Maggert, who was divorced, had lived with her four-year-old daughter in Cedar Rapids. On March 22, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Lembke of Elkader, had picked up the small girl for what was described as a "routine visit" to their home.

Dead for Week

A medical examiner's report said Mrs. Maggert may have been dead for as long as a week at the time her body was found. Death was ruled due to "beating and exposure."

Hopewell indicated that reports she may have been seen



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Award Johnson Park Dam Work

IOWA CITY — After negotiations with the low bidder, the Johnson county conservation board Thursday night in a special session awarded a contract for construction of a dam in Kent park west of Tiffin. The contract approved went to Oliphant Engineering of Toddville for \$94,080.

When bids were opened for the second time May 3, the Oliphant firm had submitted a bid of \$154,000 for the total project or \$131,000 with several alternate deductions. The negotiations eliminated further items.

Board Chairman Robert Osmundson said the contract awarded would allow for the basic construction. He said it is hoped water can begin being impounded for the lake in 1969.

Hailstorm a Disaster for Botanists at U. of Iowa

IOWA CITY — Hail — to a this variety successfully raised commercial greenhouse operator at the university.

Some of the plants escaped damage entirely, others will have to be discarded or nursed back to health before again becoming useful for research or classroom study.

Dr. Robert Hulbary, chairman of the botany department, explained the loss this way: "When you have an experimental animal that gets into a fight, it ceases to be a research animal. Accordingly, many of our damaged plants may be lost to experiments now in progress, though they may still survive."

An example is a rare specimen collected in Mexico two summers ago by Dr. Thomas Melchert, a member of the botany faculty. This plant, Melchert explained, was discovered more than a century ago, but for the last 100 years has been lost to taxonomists trying to trace the evolutionary history of the genus to which it belongs. Melchert found the plant in the Sierra Madre mountains of Mexico.

Only One The specimen of the species damaged in Wednesday's storm was the only flowering plant of
