Pre-Teaching Program Planned For This Fall
FAYETTE — Upper Iowa College will inaugurate a "pre-student teaching" or "September experience" for future teachers this fall, according to Dr. Donald Postvedt, director of student teaching.

Under the program students who are preparing to become teachers will be required to spend five days at the beginning of a fall school term with a public school faculty. The five days will include the normal faculty workshop or orientation period. Dr. Postvedt stated that Upper Iowa officials believe this new experience "will be of tremendous value to our students" who plan to become teachers.

Since U.I.C. does not begin classes in the fall until after most public schools have started, students will be permitted to have their "September experience" in either the school where they will student-teach later in the year, or in a school near their residence for the summer.

DES MOINES—John H. Cruise, city clerk of Corning, Ia., announced today that he will seek the nomination for State Treasurer on the Democratic ticket in the September Primary. In making the announcement Cruise said, "if elected, I pledge to continue the investment policy implemented by State Treasurer Paul Franzburg as it is my judgment that all Iowans not only expect, but also deserve to have idle funds invested at interest and I intend to carry out this program."
