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A discolored at Flagler, Colo., 120 miles west of here, Tuesday morning, sent the Republican river on a rampage which caused much anxiety to people of the valley, as recently visited by a disastrous flood. When the river rose, it came in at all points along the river of approach, high water and residents of the lowlands were warned to move to higher land up to the summit of Thurston; the river had not risen enough to cause any alarm, although it was up several feet and moving in a swift current, the row of which could be heard a considerable distance.

Trouns people, realizing the terrible violence of the flood of May 31, took to the hills, Tuesday night. Watchmen were placed at the river in all towns, ready to give the alarm should conditions become serious.

The portion bridge, crossing the river at this point, was withdrawn for fear of being hit, but will be replaced when the river subsides. Unless there flood water is equipped into the highlands, it is not believed the river will rise to a dangerous point. It is well to be alert, however, since a watch will be maintained until all danger is over.
