Mother and Daughter Lose Lives in Sunday's Flood

Mr. Harold Mosier, 24, and his 5-year-old daughter, Betty Jean, were taken to the Republican River bridge to the Republican River. The Mosier family had moved from their home in Union county to the bridge and had established a temporary home in the canyon below. A wall of water rushed out from the canyon bridge and washed the Mosier home away. The family, holding hands, left the farm home in a boat, and plunged into the water in an attempt to get to higher ground. Betty Jean lost her life and was swept away by the water. Her mother, in attempting to rescue the girl, was also drowned. Mr. Mosier and four other children escaped by reaching safety.
