 - Overall half of the state is in severe drought or greater (D2 or greater).



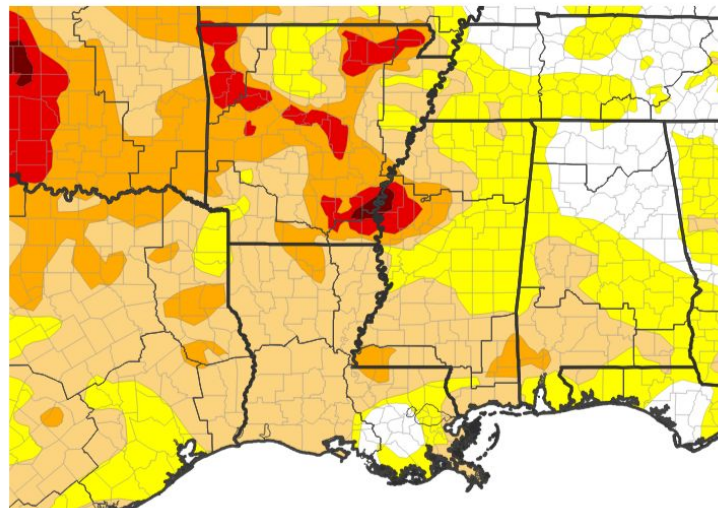

- Drought intensity and extent:
 - **D4 (Exceptional Drought)**: Portions of southeast Arkansas.
 - **D3 (Extreme Drought)**: Widely scattered areas of the state.
 - **D2 (Severe Drought)**: Scattered areas of the state.
 - **D1 (Moderate Drought)**: Many areas of the state not classified as a higher category.
 - **D0: (Abnormally Dry)**: The rest of the state not in a classification of drought (D1 or greater).

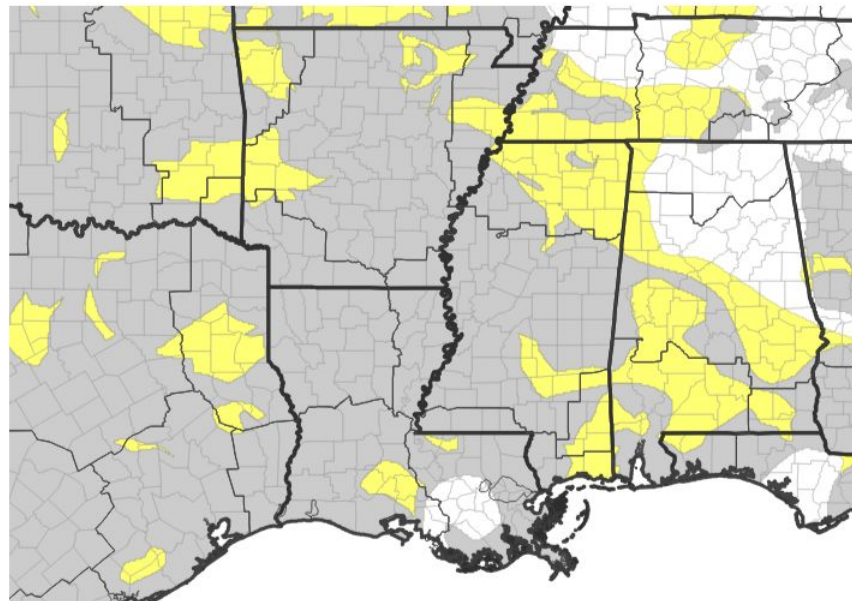


Recent Change in Drought Intensity

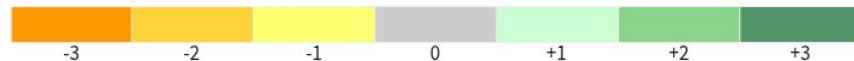

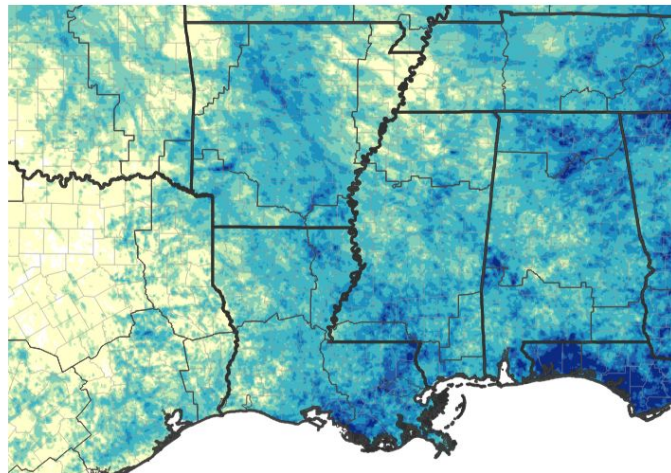




Precipitation

30-Day Precipitation Accumulations (Inches)



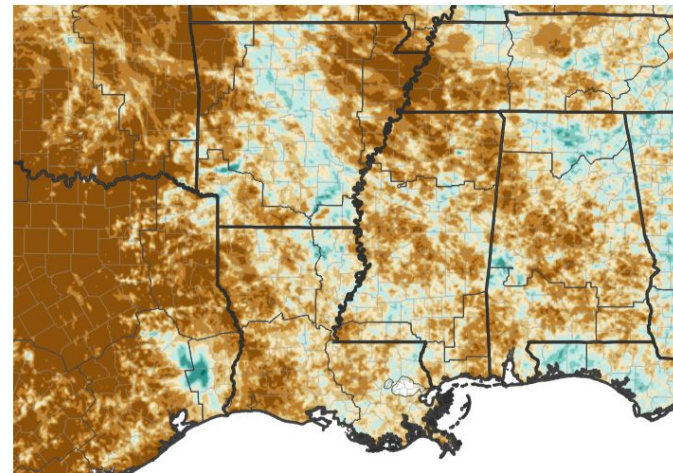
Inches of Precipitation



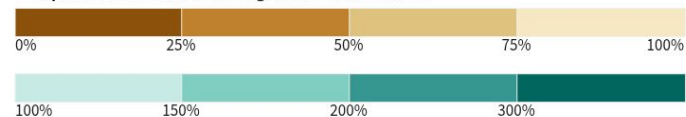

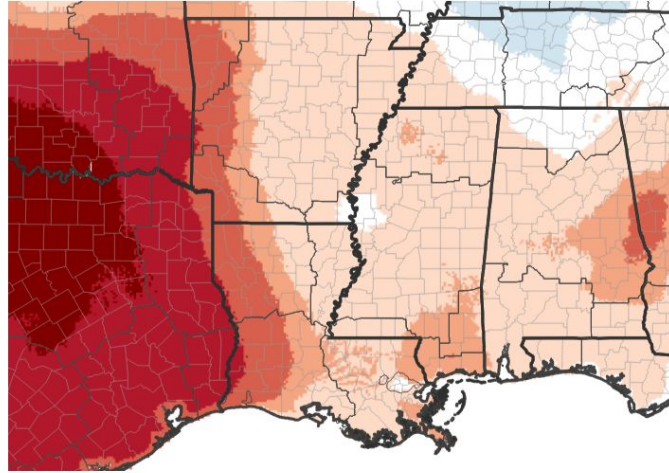




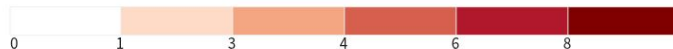
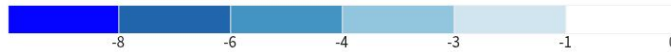
Temperature

7-Day Temperature Anomaly



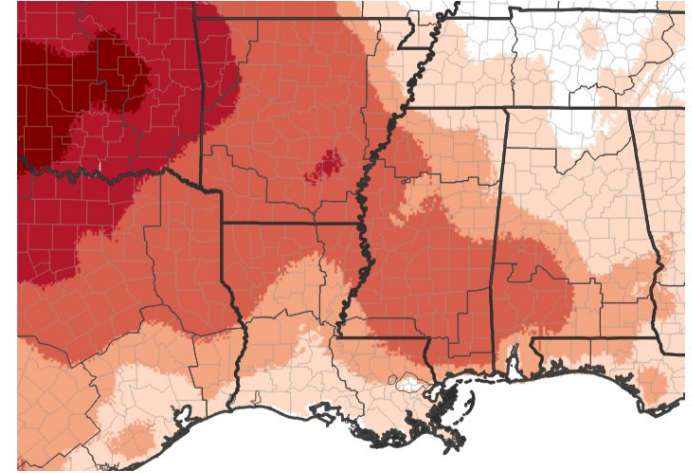
Departure from Normal Max Temperature (°F)



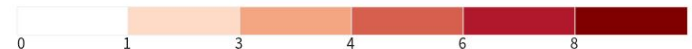

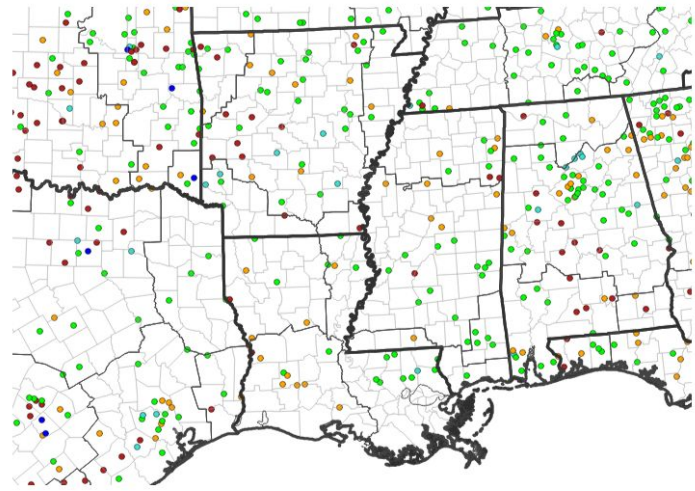




Hydrologic Conditions and Impacts

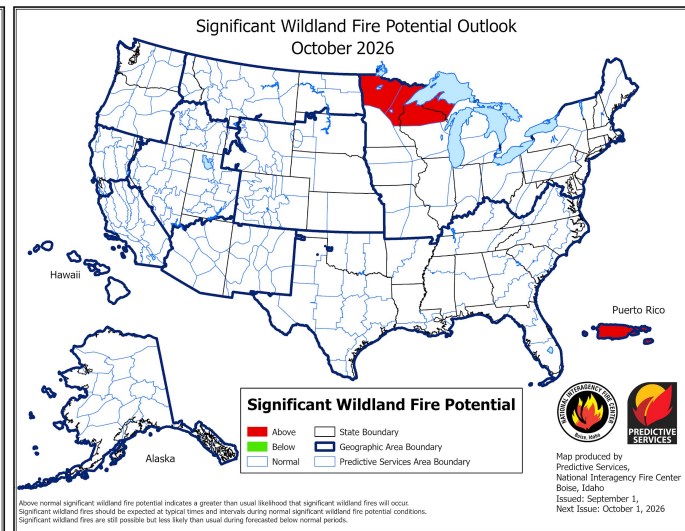
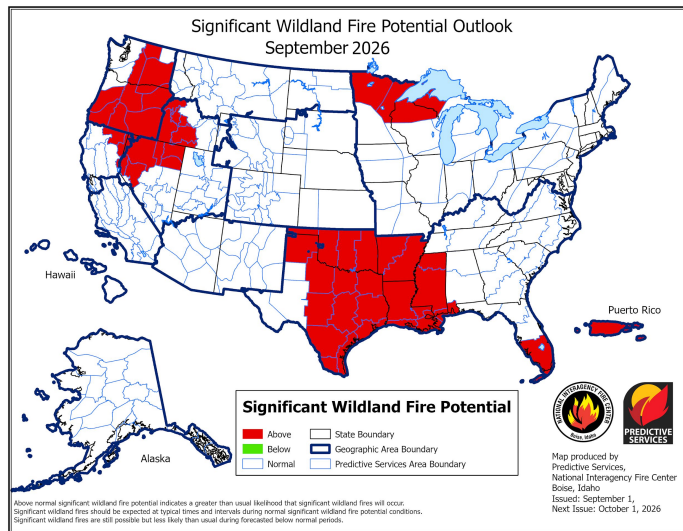




Fire Hazard Impacts

- Fire danger conditions have increased across the state.

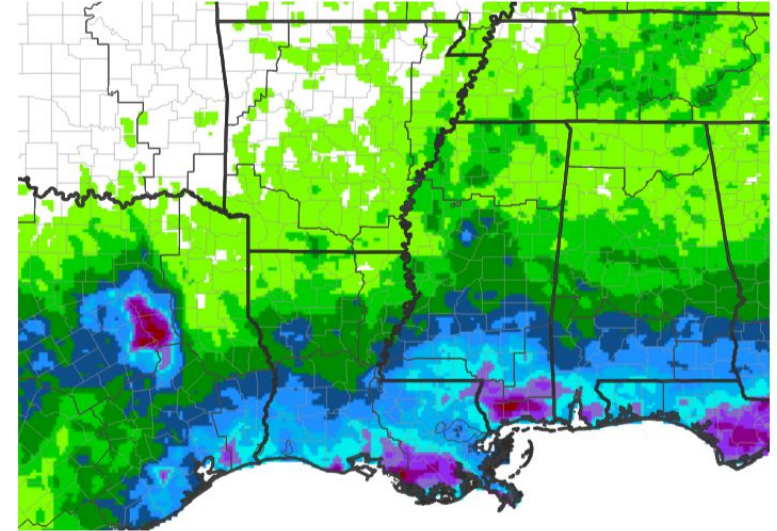




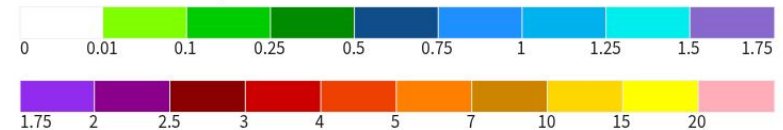
Seven Day Precipitation Forecast

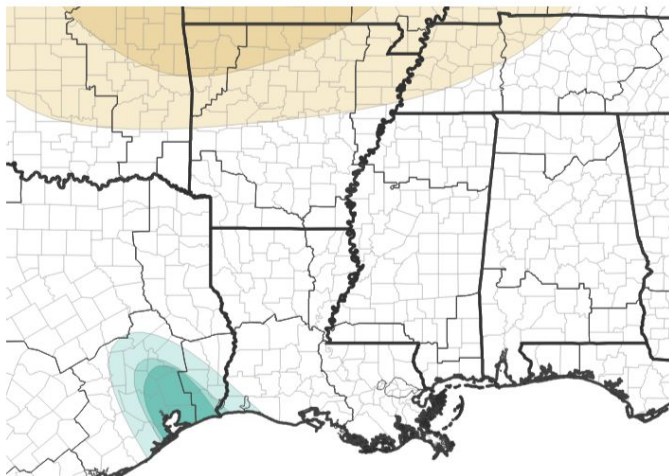

Monthly Precipitation Outlook for September 1, 2026–September 30, 2026



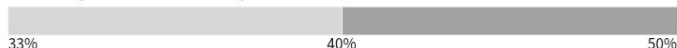
Probability of Below-Normal Precipitation



Probability of Above-Normal Precipitation



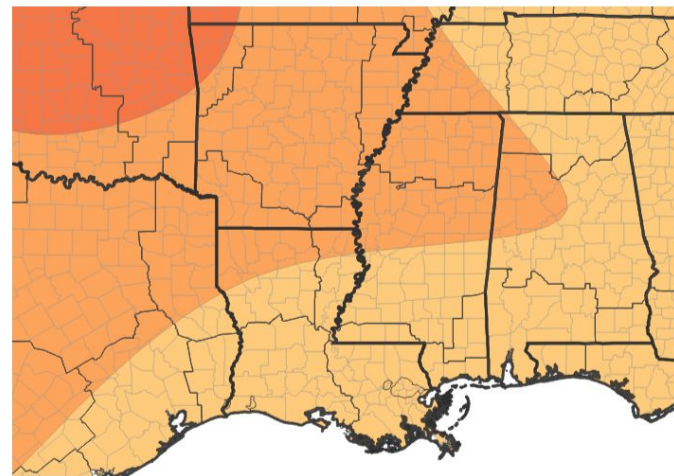
Probability of Near-Normal Precipitation

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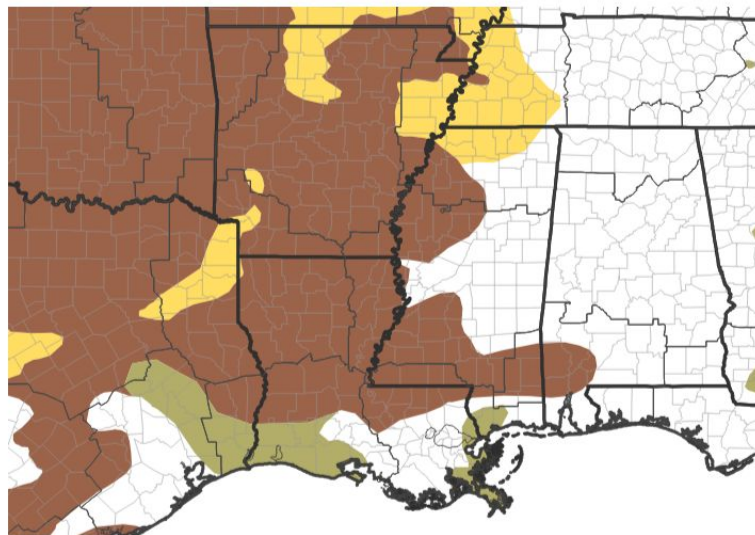


Drought Outlook
